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REMOTE WORK SETTING – GUIDE FOR PARENTS

- Students should aim to complete work in line with the ‘suggested timetable’
- This does not have to be adhered to rigidly; it is a guideline for how long students should be spending on each subject per week. Some students may wish to do more and ample work will be provided.
- Students should spend approximately 45 minutes on each ‘lesson’.
- Students should complete work set in whichever form they find most appropriate.
- Completed work should be kept in an electronic or hard-copy folder ready to be handed in on their return.
- All work set is focusing on revisiting and consolidating topics already covered.
- Short research, creative or discovery tasks will also be set to break up more formal learning.
- If students have any questions on the work set, or if they require any support or guidance, then all teachers are available on their school email addresses, which can be accessed through the school email system.
- All teacher email addresses are available on the school website.
- Children can also contact their tutor, Head of Year, PSO or learning assistant mentor (where appropriate) for support during this time.

Please note:

- Students should use the work set to strengthen and deepen existing knowledge and skills and to retain good study habits and routines
- For examined courses (Year 9/10/12) students should make full use of the revision materials available to make notes and study to re-enforce the knowledge and skills already taught in school
- New content and new skills linked to planned assessments and exams will be taught in full when we return to school.
- Mental and physical health will be best supported if home school work is viewed as revision and extension work rather than as a direct replacement for school lessons.
